#### Karrie Long, Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officer, Safer Care Victoria

Karrie is a visionary nursing leader with nearly 20 years' experience driving health delivery innovation to ensure safer and more effective patient care. She has a Graduate Diploma in Advanced Clinical Nursing (Rural Critical Care) and a Master of Public Health.

#### Matt Sharp, Chief Executive, Goulburn Valley Health

Matt Sharp has been the Chief Executive at GV Health since June 2018. Before commencing at GV Health, Mr Sharp held the position of Executive Director of Clinical Operations at Eastern Health.

During his time with GV Health, Mr Sharp has forged strong professional relationships within the community. He has worked with state and federal governments to secure funding for much-needed health services.

### Sarah Miller, ED Care Coordinator Team Lead/Project Lead, Monash Health

Sarah Miller is currently the Project Lead at Monash Health and has been tasked to undertake a service review of our Allied Health Emergency Department Care Coordination model of care. She is passionate about improving patient flow and ensuring a sustainable, skilled allied health workforce to support excellent patient care.

Sarah returned to Monash Health in October 2022, after spending time in the NHS (UK) and the Department of Health (in Victoria and NSW). # John Elcock, Executive Director Medical Services and Chief Medical Officer, Goulburn Valley Health

John Elcock was appointed to his current role at Goulburn Valley (GV) Health in August 2019. He has been a medical administrator in Victoria for over twenty years, hence the grey hair.

After graduating in medicine in 1987 John was a full-time clinician for 13 years, working in general medicine, anaesthetics, emergency medicine and general practice. Then, just for something different he taught English whilst living in Finland for a year. He also has a background in military medicine and is a Lieutenant Colonel in the Australian Army.

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John's professional interests include effective medical governance, ethical medical practice, medical leadership, and state-wide health strategy and policy. He serves on a number of Department of Health and Safer Care Victoria state-wide advisory committees.

## Amy McKimm, Chief Digital Health Officer, Alfred Health

As Executive Director of Information Development (IDD), Ms McKimm is responsible for supporting Alfred Health through its digital transformation. This includes the strategic use of data and systems so clinical care at the bedside is performed with all the information required for excellence.

IDD covers all aspects of IT infrastructure and support, projects, applications development, security, privacy, and the ongoing development of the electronic medical record which is a strategic focus for the organisation. Ms McKimm recently lead Alfred Health's electronic Timely Quality Care (eTQC) Program which went live in October 2018. She has worked in a number of clinical and operational roles in health services in Australia and the United Kingdom and in 2018, completed Leadership Victoria's Williamson Leadership Program. Ms McKimm's interest is in using technology, data and digital platforms to support healthcare to adapt and change in order to better meet the needs of patients and the broader community.

### Andrew Wilson, Chief Medical Officer, SCV

Spanning a successful career in clinical medicine, Andrew continues to practise as a cardiologist at St Vincent's Health Melbourne, in the private sector and in rural Victoria. His clinical focus is on treatment and prevention of atherosclerosis. He previously worked at Stanford University Medical Centre where he was a NHMRC Research Fellow focusing on translational research in atherosclerosis.
